From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Friends in Christ:

This Sunday's readings speak to us about two pillars of Christian living: faithfulness in the ordinary and prayer for all people.

In the Gospel, Jesus reminds us that "the person who is trustworthy in very small matters is also trustworthy in

"the who is hy in all matalso hy in

great ones" (Luke 16:10). How true this is in daily life! Faith is not only proven in great sacrifices, but also in the small, hidden choices we make each day. Do we speak the truth when it would be easier to bend it? Do we treat others with respect, even when no one notices? Do we use money and possessions wisely—as tools for good—rather than letting them take hold of our hearts? Jesus is clear: we cannot serve both God and mammon. Eventually, one will claim our loyalty. Faithfulness begins with the little things, but over time, it shapes our entire life.

St. Paul, in his letter to Timothy (1 Timothy 2:1–8), emphasizes the other pillar: prayer. He urges us to pray "for everyone, for kings and for all in authority, that we may lead a quiet and tranquil life." Paul widens our vision. Prayer is not just for ourselves and our families, but for all people, even those we might find difficult to pray for. Why? Because prayer aligns our hearts with God's desire—that "all may be saved and come to knowledge of the truth." When we pray in this way, we grow beyond self-interest and learn to see the world through Christ's heart of mercy.

Taken together, these readings remind us that discipleship is both practical and spiritual. It is practical, in that our loyalty to God is shown in the honesty, integrity, and compassion of daily life. It is spiritual, in that all we do is to be rooted in prayer—prayer that lifts up others, seeks peace, and keeps us centered on the Lord.

As we reflect this week, perhaps we can ask ourselves: In what small, everyday way can I be more faithful to God? And how can I broaden my prayer to include someone or some group I rarely pray for? If we live faithfully

in the little things and pray broadly for all, we will be serving the one Master who alone brings life and peace.

"Encourage one another and build one another up, as indeed you do." (1 Thessalonians 5:11) That verse came to mind as I reflected on our parish picnic. The day was filled with encouragement, joy, and the kind of fellowship that builds up the Body of Christ. From the laughter of children to the conversations shared over a meal, there was a spirit of unity and friendship that reminded us of the blessing of belonging to a parish family.



Our picnic was much more than an afternoon of food and games—it was a living witness of our life in Christ together. These moments of gathering strengthen our bonds, deepen our faith, and remind us that parish life is not just about Sunday worship but about walking together in all the ordinary and joyful moments of life.

What struck me most was how naturally people of every age and background came together. Whether cheering during the contests, chatting under the tents, or working side by side in service, the whole day reflected what it

means to be "church"—a people united in faith and love.

None of this could have happened without the hard work and generosity of so many. I am



especially grateful to the Knights of Columbus for their dedication in organizing, to Mike Cipriano and Patti Flynn-Harris for their leadership with food preparation and volunteers, and to the countless others who served, set up, cleaned up, and simply showed up with joy. Your efforts are a true gift to our community.



I was so pleased to see the excitement over our special surprise as the Ice Cream Truck pulled into the lot. There were so many smiling faces and people running to get into line. It was such a simple treat, yet it brought so much joy. You could see friends chatting in line, kids comparing their favorite flavors, and adults letting themselves enjoy a little childlike delight. Moments like these remind us that community is built not only through the big events but also through these small, unexpected joys that bring us together.

As we look ahead, may the memory of our picnic inspire us to keep building one another up. Let us continue to live our faith not only in prayer and worship, but in fellowship, encouragement, and service. Together, we form not just a community, but a family in Christ—and for that, we give thanks.

This year, our Annual Family Commitment will focus on **new lighting for** the interior of our church. Our current system is outdated and inefficient. By installing a modern, energy-efficient design, we will both enhance the reverence and beauty of our worship space and provide better visibility for all who gather to pray. This is the next phase of our ongoing improvements to our worship space, helping to create an environment that reflects the light of Christ we celebrate at the altar.

While the sale of our other campus has provided us with a measure of stability

and the ability to address some largescale projects, this was a one-time blessing. The majority of those funds were invested to provide our parish with stability and security for the future. But the Annual Family Commitment allows us to sustain the daily life of our parish, take on new projects, and continue growing as a vibrant, welcoming family of faith.

Your commitment—whether large or small—truly makes a difference. Each gift is a sign of gratitude to God and a concrete way of ensuring that our parish remains a beacon of welcome, faith, and community.

Thank you for all the ways you already support our parish. May God bless you and your family abundantly for your generosity.

Hello and welcome back to Yakety Yak with Father Yates. This week, I received the following question, "Father, who do I need to be obedient to?"

Thank you for this question. When the spiritual life seems too confusing to me, returning to Mother Teresa's writings is a great way to find a clear answer. She is so simple and practical. What should you do, she'd return my question. Go find and care for Jesus: in your home and your community, even in your own heart, she'd reply. And then smile.

From her book <u>Where There is Love, There is God</u>, she wrote, "I'm always surprised that God nowhere spoke to Our Lady directly. He spoke through the prophets, He spoke to Moses, He spoke to everybody possible in the Bible, but we don't see anywhere [that] God spoke to Our Lady directly. It was through the angel, it was through St. Joseph, and so on . . . and this is

obedience. That surrender. I belong to Him, He can use me, He can do what He wants with me and to us sisters, God is not going to speak to us."

So beautiful, so clear! Classic Mother Teresa. And yet I wonder, the issue of obedience is a little more complicated for lay people. To whom are we to be obedient? What does it mean to be truly obedient in a lay vocation? What does obedience look like in the family? Earlier in the book Mother Teresa expressed her suspicion that children today have such a problem with obedience because their parents aren't yielding to each other out of love.

Yes, we have people in our lives that have authority over us and we are to be obedient to them. Just as God used others to speak to Mary, God is using other people to talk to us. I cannot be specific about who has authority over us in this article, because it will be different for each of us. However, I believe we can learn from Mother Teresa and Our Mother Mary, that we need to maintain our obedience to those in authority over us. As always, I love you, Father Yates








m F}$ ather Joseph Benicewicz will never be forgotten by all those who knew him, especially by the parishioners, faculty, staff and students at St. Paul Parish and St. Paul School in Kensington.

As the former pastor of the parish and school, the Franciscan priest, who died unexpectedly on Sept. 6, 2024, is being remembered fondly this fall through a memorial scholarship, Masses, a run and a walk.

Beginning with the 2025-2026 school year, four students are benefiting from the "Father Joseph Benicewicz Memorial Scholarship." According to Principal Jill Conaway, four student families received \$250 each for a total of \$1,000 in scholarships. "It's to keep his memory alive going forward," Conaway says.

The scholarships were distributed to students who are practicing Catholics with a financial need, in keeping with Father Benicewicz's

"It was important to Father Joe to never turn away families in need, who were committed to having a Catholic education for their children," says Kelly Esposito, director of admissions and marketing, who noted the school also offers other forms of financial assistance.

The priest - who served as a teacher, principal and school president in previous

assignments - loved to spend time with students. Before his passing, he led the St. Paul School children weekly in Mass and prayer, visited them in their classrooms, and even attended their basketball games.

As soon as teachers heard the news of his death last year, they suggested the scholarship in his name and began raising funds for the endeavor. The principal and advancement director got the ball rolling by setting aside a small portion of funds from the "Lion's Pride Fun Run," an already existing annual school fundraiser, to establish the Father Benicewicz Memorial Scholarship Fund. The school's next Lion's Pride Fun Run is slated for Oct. 9.

The admissions director and athletic director also partnered to start the "Father Joe Memorial Basketball Game" in which the basketball coaches challenged the boys and girls varsity team players, all while wearing "Father Joe" T-shirts. Proceeds from ticket sales and concessions went to the scholarship fund. Next year's game is already set for Feb. 7 from 1 to 3 p.m.

Additional scholarship donations are accepted throughout the year and

processed through the Advancement Office, where each contribution is recorded and acknowledged, Esposito says.

Over at St. Paul Church on the weekend of Sept. 6, 7 and 8, near the anniversary of his death, the entire parish just celebrated three memorial Masses, offering special prayer intentions for Father Benicewicz.

Additionally, this coming October, St. Paul Parish will host the "Father Joe Memorial Walk and Gathering on the Parish Green" on Oct. 5, following the 12 p.m. Mass. The 3.1-mile walk will begin at 1:30 p.m.

Polish food will be available for purchase from Belvedere in New Britain - one of Father Joe's favorites. The event will also include games and music.




